The Economic Opportunity Board of Clark County has purchased the Sunrise/Jiffy Mar-ket located at 631 North "H" Street, the food market is a non-profit operation which will help serve the WIC Program for pregnant and nursing mothers and infants and children up to 5 years old receive monthly allotments up to 5 years old receive monthly allotments of about \$22.00 worth of milk-formula, cheese, eggs, cereal and juice. To be eligible for the program, women and children must be deter-mined to be "at nutritional risk" because of inadequate nutrition and income. At this time about 1700 mothers and children in Clark County are receiving WIC foods. The Sunrise/ Jiffy Market will also serve the county with other food items on hand, at present the market is well-stocked with a variety of food items. The market hours are 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. six (6) cays a week, and 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. on Sunday. In 1872, the National Baptist Sunday School Convention, held in Cincinnati, Ohio, published a fresh hymn and tune called "Need." Its popularity spread and it became universally known by its first line, "I need thee every hour."

The hymn was written by annie Sherwood Hawks (1835-1918) while sitting in her living room. She noted that somehow the rooms around seemed to be like Jacob's hillside, "the house of God, the gate of heaven." "I was so filled with a sense of nearness to my Master."

she wrote from her Brooklyn ,


Most gracious Lord No tender voice like thine Can peace afford.
