1T BEGAN IN 1974-Congress passed new legislation called the Community Development Act to provide block grants of money to cities to expand economic opportunities principally for persons of tow and moderate income, and provide decent housing in a suitable living environment. The official goals of the Act are to: eliminate and prevent deterioration, eliminate hazards through housing rehabilitation, conserve and expand the housing supply, improve the quality and quantity of community services, make rational use of the land, reduce the isolation of income groups, and restore and preserve properties of aesthetic or historic value. The City_of Las Vegas this year will receive \$1,885,000 from the Federal government to be used for these purposes.

Greetings:

This letter is to express my deep concern, as well as that of others I have talked with about the economic status of minorities and disadvantaged people in northern Nevada. The situation here (northern Nevada) may be more critical than in Clark county. According to

critical than in Clark county. According to some reports, there's a lot to be desired to measure up to equality in Clark county as it relates to federal funds that are sent into the state to assist the people in raising their standard of living.

There are many people in northern Nevada who have expressed grave disappointment in Congressman Santini. A group of several minorities requested a meeting with him prior to the election last year to discuss the problems of the Washoe County CETA funding that had refused to allow five minority groups (i.e. Race Relations Center; NAACP; ELSOL; (i.e. Race Relations Center; NAACP; ELSOL; Construction-Opportunity Trust; O.I.C.) to participate in Title I training funds. This was a tragedy to minorities during the height of unemployment. As of today, Blacks and other minorities are not allowed to have CETA contracts under Title I, Washoe County. There were also questions about revenue sharing funds, community development monies, small business administration funds, etc. To this day, Congressman Santini has not met with these groups to discuss their problems.

As it has been expressed, Congressman Santini has done a lot for many people, but at the same time has ignored a plea from minority groups who were discriminated against, harassed, and intimidated by the powerful office of the Department of Labor in San Francisco and the local Washes County in San Francisco and the local Washoe County CETA staff.

Minorities are going to have to look for someone to elect to state-wide office other than officials like Congressman Santini. Letter answering politics are something of the past. People not only want answers to their letters, they also want answers to their problems. Continued on page 6 column 3
