The Marion Bennett Youth Program was established in 1976 as an outpatinet drug treatment center for Westside youth. Since its inception, the program has expanded into five major service areas. Youth may participate in one or all services which are: Counseling (individual, group, family) drug or non-drug related; tutoring (individual, group), remedial math and reading, G.E.D or college preparatory, Job Development (trainign, survival skills, development and placement); activities (modeling, personal development, arts and crafts, creative dance) and sports (football, basketball, karate, amateur boxing and soccer). At present, the Marion Bennett Youth Program is working with over 1000 youth between the ages of 10 - 20 years in the greater Las Vegas Metropolitan area.
