

If you ever pass the corner of Lake Mead and "J" you have seen the initial site of the Marion Bennett Youth Program. The facility is located at 1084 W. Lake Mead, directly across the street from the Doolittle Recreation Center. The Marion Bennett Youth Program is

a non-profit organization which provides the community youth with twelve different pro-grams including Drug Counseling, Tutoring, Survival Skills Training, Career Counseling, Youth Conservation Community Improvement Program, Adult Training, Amateur Boxing, Activities, Sports, Miss Black Teenager of Nevada Pageant, Needlework Classes and Jazz Dance Class.

The newest program entitled "Youth Em-ployment and Training Program" (YETP), funded through C.E.T.A., was designed to make significant long term impact on the structural unemployment problems of minority youth and to enhance the job prospects and career opportunities of young people.

The Youth Employment and Training Program plan for out-of-school youth will serve approximately 1,000 participants for one year (January-December, 1978). Clients are pro-vided tutorial assistance to pass G.E.D. tests, Career Exploration/Vocational exposure training and job development services. The goals are as follows:

To reduce unemployment among youth. To develop individual long-term employability plans.

To improve quality/cooperation of existing services to youth.

To experiment with new approaches to

fuller youth employment. To inform Congress on future strategy. To develop feeder information into a cen-

tral job services bank.

The Marion Bennett Youth Program takes pride in our accomplishments; moreover, in the accomplishments of the youth whom we are involved.

This organization gathers its strength from many sources, both public and private, in an effort to control negative forces such as

illiteracy, poverty and unemployment. Within the next few years, we hope to enhance existing programs. With careful consideration for an increasing youth population, the Marion Bennett Youth Program, Inc. will endeavor to create resourceful new plans which will meet the needs of youth - for today and for the future.


