THE CHRISTIANS by Bamber Gascoigne It's a big, beautiful, remarkable book on the story of the most influential religious move-ments in man's history - Christianity. No other work I have ever seen captures all the magnificance and the trials of 20 centuries world-wide involvement left by the legacy of Jesus Christ. Lavishly illustrated and sensitively written, this is a book that should become the basis for a quality series for PBS television in the manner of "civilization."

THE DEBATE ABOUT THE BIBLE by Stephen Davis

Is the Bible ever in error? If you have ever asked yourself that question or allowed that doubt to enter your mind, and still consider yourself an Evangelical Christian, then the book will help you toward a personal answer through an understanding of the author's belief in infallibility.

DARK SALVATION by Harry Richardson

Methodism was founded and grew in the period of slavery, and its history is closely tied to the development of religion among Blacks in America. This is the story of that religious movement and its separations into two major churches. It is also the newly told story of the Black experience in America, from its African origins to the present day.
