The Black community has traditionally been noted as a leader in distilled spirits trends.

So too with the new drinks coming up in popularity in the U.S.; among them, imported liqueurs and domestic cordials. U.S. sales of Scotches, Bourbons and blended whiskies have been declining; liqueurs and cordials have been riging. According to the National Association rising. According to the National Association of Alcoholic Beverage Importers, Inc., the liquor trade group, imported liqueurs and cordials rose 17 percent in the first six months

of 1977. In fact trade experts indicate, by the beginning of the next decade, these sweeter liqueurs may well be the third largest sell-

liqueurs may well be the third largest seling segment in the distilled spirits industry.

Liqueurs, or cordials as they are more often called in the United States, have been known since the times of the Pharaohs, and trace back to the ancient civilizations in Ur and Chaldea. Commercial production can be traced back as far as the Middle Ages when monks, physicians and alchemists were engaged in a search for the elixir of life and discovered that grapes and aromatic plants could be distilled, coming up with the beverages named after the fraternal orders that developed them, such as Chartreuse and Benedictine.

Through the years, other plants, fruits, flowers, berries and natural products were used -- cocoa, chocolate, almonds, cherries,

Now, probably the toughest secret of all has been tamed -- and tea, elusive through so many centuries, has been brought to the bottle by a world-renowned German distiller in the Tiffin 70 proof liqueur.

Tiffin is the result of more than twenty-two

years of experimentation and development. Creating a true tea liqueur was the personal project of Heinrich Riemerschmid, sole proprietor of Anton Riemerschmid Distillers of Germany, a leading distiller of quality liqueurs for more than one hundred years.

An enthusiastic tea drinker who always has "at least twenty varieties of tea at home and brews a different type every day," Mr. Rie-merschmid regarded the development of a true tea liqueur as a major challenge to the distiller's art.
"The fact that in the entire history of the

world no liqueur was successfully made from

world no liqueur was successfully made from real tea before this proved how difficult the project actually was, he says.

"Although not generally known, tea is a rising beverage in the Black communities of the U.S.; iced tea in the summer; hot tea in the winter", said Harvey R. Chaplin, President of Shaw-Ross. "Tiffin added to tea makes a delightful alcoholic beverage drink because it blends so well and adds to the tea flavor.
