ROWE'S NOTEBOOK

How many great men are in the world today? One less than you think; General Daniel "Chappie" James is dead! To better express the feelings of this long time friend, I take liberties with some of the words John Gillespie Magee, Jr. used to paragraph to-gether his "High Flight."

In lonely dedication Daniel "Chappie" James troded the high unsurpassed sanctity of space in hot pursuit of the enemies of America.

In alien lands -- in sun-split clouds he

did a thousand heroic things.

In easy grace, he skirted the shouting wind and topped the horizon's airless height. On man made wings he ventured far beyond where lark or eagle dared to

Now at last --- He can reach out his hands and touch the face of God.

In life "Chappie" was a supreme member of the most deadly, exciting and glamorous profession in the world, the United States Airforce. His chest bore his wings with more pride and passion than most Americans, and he was instrumental in shooting down many of the corps' bias banners. His voluntary response to the compelling obligation of defense of country and neglected human needs, enlarged the horizon of all the brothers within the winged society. His action gave them a new sense of self confidence and an awarness of the tremendous work yet to be done. His progress was over the 'dead bodies' of prejudice rules and regulation. This made each gain both dramatic and significant, not just for black Americans, but the nation itself which was founded on that paradox, the eligibil-

ity of the free.
"Chappie" was democracy's most outstanding flying salesman, one not eroded by power brokers or a lack of civic consciousness. He was born and bred in the intolerant and baffling atmosphere of "seperate, but equal, to perpetuate the deep seated white prejudice the South. Fortified by the faith and confidence of a mother who exacted from him a commitment to excellence, he fought his way out of the bias bog of his time. He attained manhood with a good grasp of honesty, integrity and the unusual smarts that one isn't tied to the starting block. The great magic of his life was believing in himself and I have never known him to let down physically or spirit-

ually or lose his appetite for what comes next.
It was no fluke of circumstance which elevated him above many with whom he served. A dogged determination and the fact that he never allowed his senses to be dulled by indifference or apathy to slow his drive is how he achieved international distinction. He was a beautiful person, a heroic figure, a man of intense personality with phenomenal energy and a human warmth which seemed to melt frozen spirits. The meaning of America aroused great passion in him, and created some detractors. But he was the General! And to gain a four-star rank through the bureaucratic maze of military bias is incredible, a salute to "Chappie's" vitality and promise. His move into the sanctuary of the dead was

just as impressive as his flight to glory in life. As the boys on the corner would say, "They put him away in style." Befitting the people's flavor of the man, he had a dual service, one civilian and one military. In the after dinner hour on Wednesday evening people from all over the world filled the divinely ornated National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception to celebrate a moment of a person who had too few years, but what a life he had packed into them. It was a service beyond description, presided over by Chaplain Henry J. Meade, Major Gen., Chief Chaplain, USAF. He knew his man, his achievements, his country's strengths and weaknesses, all well enough to voice in volumn and substance a eulogy which lifted the human spirit. On Thursday, in the cold numbness, before the noon of the day, hundreds watched and heard; the click of heels, the disquieting burst of gun-fire, the sadness of bugle notes, the furled

flags and the precision of military commands which triggered each action of each of the services making-up the Dept. of Defense. This was the end of the journey "Chappie" started some 50-odd yrs ago from Pensacola, Fla. It was all glory and so deserving for what was one helluva guy
