OPERATION PUSH

Last week, the Education Committee of the Senate Human Resources Committee approved legislation that would allow a tax credit of up to \$500.00 a year for every tuition paying student in college, vocational, elementary or secondary school. A similar piece of legislation is expected to be approved soon in the House Education and Labor Committee. The middle class, disgusted with public educational institutions on the one hand and feeling the economic crunch on the other, are attempting to use their political power to gain relief.

The Carter Administration, feeling the same pressure, is opposing the tax credit proposal, but is offering a grant-in-aid package to families with incomes over \$16,000.00 which would have the same political and economic, i.e. fiscal impact. Carter, for political reasons, preferred that his education proposal be considered before the Education Committees rather than the Tax Committees headed by Russell Long in the Senate and Al Ullman in the House.

PUSH opposes both the Packwood-Moynihan Bill for tax credits and the Carter Administration's grant-in-aid program for the following reasons:

1. The tax credit proposal raises serious constitutional questions of separation of church and state. Since most private schools are church connected, such a tax credit proposal has been (and we believe will continue to be) held unconstitutional. The only government funding to private schools now held constitutional is for specific qualified purposes, not a general write off, as in the tax credit proposal.
2. PUSH opposes these bills because it leads to a self-fulfilling prophecy. Public education in the United States is in serious trouble. Both of these bills would simply perpetuate the problem and actually accelerate the rate of deterioration. It is like giving a drowning man a glass of water.
3. Push opposes this legislation because it perpetuates both racism and classism in the society and would implicate the Federal Government in the process.

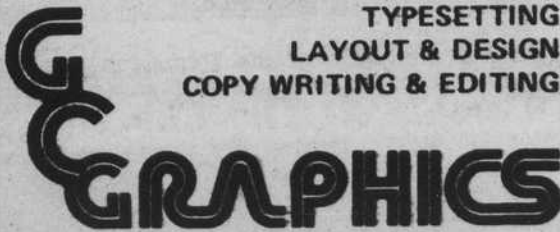
PUSH suggest the following as alternatives:

1. We must make a determination, judgement and commitment to save and improve the public schools in our society. We must educate the masses not merely the classes, and only the public school system can educate the masses. Over the last decade our society has made some progress in increasing the options for a number of black, Spanish speaking and other groups traditionally left out of education. Because of this mix (black, brown, white, rich and poor), we have made some progress on resolving the problems of racism and classism in publicly financed schools.
2. PUSH contends that if the money being proposed for a tax credit and grant-in-aid program were used instead to improve the public school system, the need for relief to those attending private schools.

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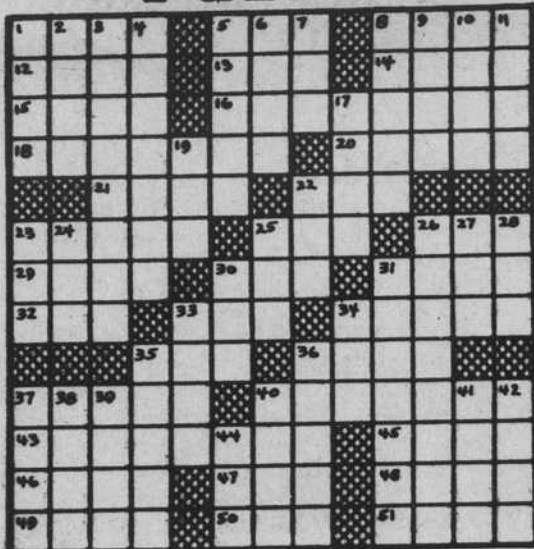


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Crossword Puzzle
