Presentation of a first place award to the Nevada Highway Department for excellence construction was made at one of the last official apperances of outgoing Highway Engineer Grant Bastian who resigned to enter private business last week after 17 years in the Department.

The occasion was the delivery of the official plaque from the Federal Highway Administration by Al Stone, Division Administrator of the Federal Highway Administration to the Department in Carson City. Bastian chose his executive assistant Bill Engel to re-

chose his executive assistant Bill Engel to receive the honors since Engel originated Nevada's entry in the 10-year old competition.

The plaque honored Nevada for a \$6 million Interstate 80 project between Pequop Summit and Oasis, Elko County, exceptional in its application to natural terrain, scenery, and preservation of natural desert vegetation preservation of natural desert vegetation within the right of way.

The environmental factors of the project

were designed by Jack Lane of the Department's environmental section in Carson City. Resident Engineer on the construction was Charles Cress of Elko.

SEGREGATED JAZZ

A review of The Cotton Club by Jim Haskins (Random House, N.Y.), 180 pages, paperback

The great gifts of black people in America have always been exploited. Jim Haskins-who has become a faithful and magnificent chronicles Ji Jur precious black past—tells of the exploitation of our musical gifts in the music world's greatest symbol of the white prostitution of our best art, The Cotton Club.

Harlem's Cotton Club was the hottest place in America Peviews: for great black music for decades. Blacks entertained, but "for whites only" was the policy for those who would wish to enjoy the gifts we had to give.

Jim Haskins' word pictures and the photography which he has amassed represent a unique bit of history which despisers of oppres-sion and lovers of liberty should cherish.


The book is a colorful introduction to the great age of harlem, with its heyday in the 1920's, for use by high school and very serious junior high school use. As with practically all of Jim Haskins' books, The Cotton club fits into collegiate and public libraries almost as a necessity. This book is well worth reading by all adults, whether music fans or not.
