## Chaparral High

The Black History Program at Chaparral was a "standing room only" event. The purpose of the program was to give the students and public as well, an overview of past and present recollections of Black Achievements.

As history states, the Black Studies Movement was started in 1915 by the imminent scholar, Dr. Carter G. Woodson. This pathmaker's fight for Black Studies began in those years when his endeavors were neither understood nor appreciated. So, while the role of Blacks was being neglected, ignored or portrayed with bias and inaccuracies in the schools and homes, Mr. Woodson was one Black American busily paving a lonely pathway for movement of Black studies and Black Pride.
