Carl Holman, president of the National Urban Coalition, has been honored by the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) for his outstanding work in civil rights, urban affairs and equal opportunity. Holman has been president of the Urban Coalition since 1971. The Coalition is a national organization

representing leaders in business, civil rights, labor, religion, and local government which seeks to improve the conditions of urban life that have bred civil disorder. It is also concerned with changes in national attitudes, priorities and institutions and the systems of urban government by which these conditions are created and perpetuated.

In presenting the award to Holman at the conclusion of the Agency's observance of Black History Month, EPA Administrator Douglas Costle spoke of Holman's dedication and com-mitment "to the advancement of greater understanding among all Americans and for his untiring efforts and leadership in the fields of civil rights, equal opportunity, and human dignity for all."

Prior to joining the Urban Coalition, Holman served as Deputy Director of the U.S. Civil Right Commission. He holds numerous honors and awards from educational, social, governmental and activist organizations.
