



Lt. Gov. Bob Rose has announced the appointment of Hank Tester as press secretary for the Rose for Governor campaign. Tester assumes his duties immediately.

In making the announcement, Rose said that he was very pleased to have someone of Tester's background and ability to supervise the press relations aspect of his campaign.

"Hank has proven his abilities in broadcast journalism, and his tremendous experience in reporting on the political happenings throughout the state," Rose said. "In addition, his knowledge of the history of the state will be tremendously valuable to our campaign as we make every effort to communicate with as many Nevadans as possible during the coming months."

"Hank's credentials are first-rate, and I consider him to be a valuable asset to our campaign staff," Rose said.

For the past eight years, Tester has been director of news and public affairs for KLVX television in Las Vegas and has anchored the weekly news program "Newsnight 10." Tester pioneered full statewide coverage of the Nevada Legislature, and since 1971 has been a regular fixture at each Nevada Legislative session.

In addition to producing and anchoring one of the nation's highest rated public television news broadcasts, Tester has produced a number of superb documentaries about Nevada, including films on Virginia City, Goldfield, Las Vegas and a history of steamboat navigation on the Colorado River.

Tester is a 16-year veteran of broadcasting, and his reporting and producing career has included positions in Nevada and Arizona radio and television stations.

Tester has received a number of broadcast awards during his career, including the Nevada PTA "Spotlight Award" for education reporting; the "Best of the West" award from the Western Educational Society of Telecommunication for the production of the television news magazine "Nevada Realities;" and Certificate of Merit from the American Bar Association for the production of "The Keepers and the Kept," a documentary film detailing conditions within the walls of the Nevada State Prison.

Tester's wife Gloria is an aquatics instructor at the Helen J. Stewart School in Las Vegas. The Testers have one daughter, Pilar, who attends the George E. Harris Elementary School in Las Vegas.
