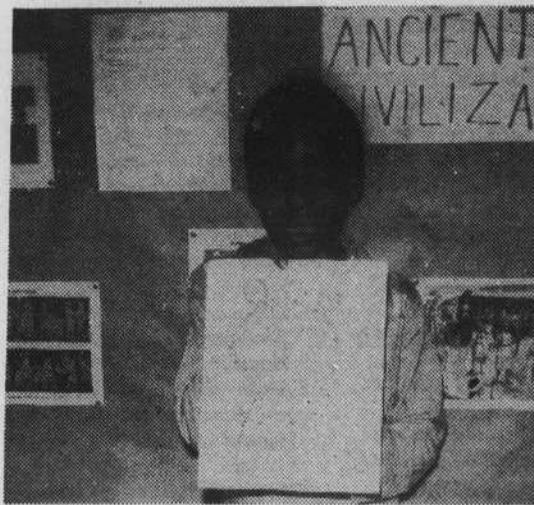

Jo Mackey Sixth Grade Center

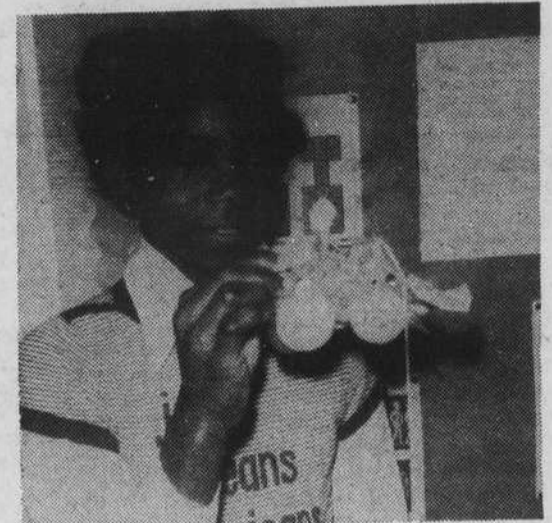
Students in Mr. Dan Pendleton's Science class at Jo Mackey Sixth Grade Center have been studying ecology and discussed the fact that people contribute to pollution in many ways: trash, sewage, burning of fossil fuels.

To help the students understand how recycling of used materials can save energy, raw materials, and the landscape they did the following activities:

1. Students collected non-biodegradable materials from the school playground. Then they were given glue, tape, paper, string and were asked to create a sculpture, picture, mobile or poster, using the materials that they had collected. The project had several benefits:
 - a. Allowed the students to be creative
 - b. Cleaned up the grounds around the school
 - c. Made the students aware of their responsibility of putting litter in its proper place.
 - d. Helped the students to understand that materials can be recycled but that it takes work to collect and remake it into something usable.

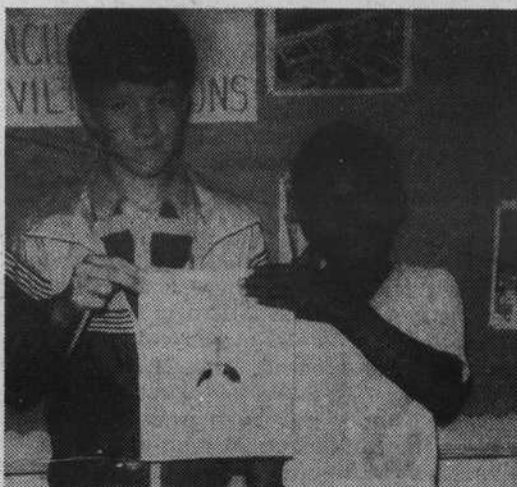
