Presented every Tuesday at 8 p.m. and Wednesday at 12:15 p.m., this production will be shown from Tuesday, May 30 to Wednesday,

July 26.

In ancient times, men were not attempting to fit figures to the stars when they created their constellations. Rather they were reminded of some legend or myth by a particular group of stars and named that region of the sky for the heros and divinities of those

legends.

With the arrival of summer, our awareness of the night sky increases as well as our couriosity about constellations. "The Time of the Triangle" helps us to gain a better understanding of these constellations and summer stars.

Produced and directed locally by Planetarium Director Dr. Dale Etheridge, admission to this show is free. Ambassador Andrew Young, Dr. Carlton Goodlet, Minister Abdul Haleem Farrakhan and Lerone Bennett will be the keynote speakers for the second annual conference of the National Black United Fund in Atlanta, Georgia at the Colony Square Hotel from June 28 - July

With the theme: "Public Policy and the Black Masses: Our Mutual Resposibility," the four-day working session is expected to attract some 3,000 paticipants from across the country.

"These speakers represent a cross section of the Black community," said Walter Bremond, executive director of the association. "We will be analysing various methods to deal with some of the crucial problems facing our communities."

According to Gregory Franks and Lnder Anderson, the conference coordinators, the chairpersons are Mayard Jackson, Mayor of Atlanta, State Senator Julian Bond, Coretta Scott King, David Franklin and Jesse Hill.

A number of workshops has been planned dealing with economic, politics, social development and cluture. The gathering will include politicians educators, entertainers and businessmen.

A major highlight of the conference will be a concert at the Atlanta Civic Center sponsored by Columbia Records. Guests to the main banquet will be entertained by such notable as Cicely Tyson and Roberta Flack. Quincy Jones, Edward Eckstine, Dr. Donald Byrd and Labaron Taylor will serve as host to many of the main sessions.

According to Dr. Carlton Goodlet, national board president of the organization, the National Black United Fund is a mechanism by which the Black community can determine its own priorities and then fund organizations and agencies working on those priorities.
