THE BLACK PRESS (continued) "The Pen Is Mightier Than The Sword"

In the area of black professionalism, the black press produced great papers, as the early papers attracted only the minds of the intelligent. There is among us a great tendency to, in some instances, accumulate power in the black press. Examples of the appreciative efforts, as they deserve to be, are the most exceptional early papers of greatness: *The New York Age*, edited by T. Thomas Fortune, and *The Richmond Planet*, edited by Mr. Mitchell. These papers and their editors were valiant warriors of incalculable benefit to their race.

Mr. Fortune was said to be a terse but caustic and biting editorial writer, and *The New York Age* had for years been uncompromising in fighting all adverse issues in race-related questions. Almost as equally complementary to Mr. Mitchell's credit was the *Richmond Planet*. More than any other, this paper during that period waged war against the oppression of the black man. Combined, these two papers and a host of others set for the "Power of the Pen," and accomplished far more to offset adverse sentiment created by the early white press than can ever be fully determined.

This reporter went with an organization known as Second Chance, Inc., to visit Rev. Charles Wyatt and the inmates at SNCC, Jean, Nevada on Monday.

Rev. Wyatt is doing an excellent job at SNCC. During our visit, which Rev. Wyatt gave up his holiday to attend, I noticed several young men going into Rev. Wyatt's office to speak to their Chaplain. No one was turned away.

There are some of the inmates who are against Rev. Wyatt, solely on the basis of his being an EX-COP. Rev. Wyatt says, "I have put the police uniform in moth balls, and do not consider myself with the police. I am a minister first, and am here because I wish to help these people."

Rev. Wyatt is a most dedicated minister, having filled the pulpit at First AME before being accepted at SNCC. At the time of his appointment at SNCC, Rev. Wyatt resigned his post at First AME Church, where Rev. Albert Dunn took his place.

Rev. Wyatt feels he can be of help to the men at SNCC, where he puts in a full day, even going so far as to give up his holiday. Now, how is that for dedication?

Rev. Wyatt stated, "I am here because this is where I have wanted to be for the last 10-15 years. I feel that finally I am where I am needed the most. Apparently God feels the same way."

After seeing SNCC and talking to some of the men there, I feel that these men need all the help they can get. Some of these men really just need someone to talk to, to show them we care.

Rev. Wyatt presented me with a Bible Dictionary, and a concordance. While leaving his office, we had to pass through the yard where the men are walking around, and several of the men came up to me and asked, "Was there a Bible class that we were not informed of?" When I told him I had just been in to see Rev. Wyatt he said, "Oh, I just thought we had been left out of a class. I sure do like it when someone comes in and helps us."

Tom Hughes went out one Sunday & taught the Sunday school class. He was very impressed with the reception he received, just as I was impressed with the reception I received. Tom went to teach, and I went to interview, while the members of Second Chance went to interview some of the inmates preparatory to helping men as they are released, but we all received the same enthusiastic reception.

I feel that most of this is due to Rev. Wyatt's dedication to these men.

We need more men like Rev. Wyatt.
