He is a servant of the people. When he becomes governor he will listen to the people. He will work for the people. Through him, the people will be our government, because he will truly represent them.

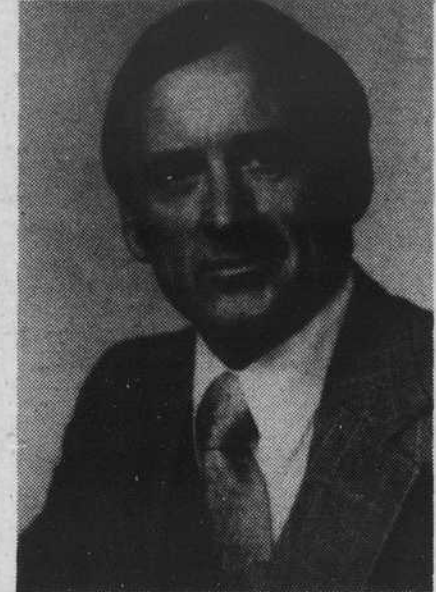
That's why we feel Jack Schofield is the man for the time . . . because he is the man for the people of Nevada.

"We need more patrol cars on the road and more cops on the beat in an effort to control crime at its source. The major place to fight crime is on the front line, where it's happening."

"What the people of Nevada are concerned about is personal safety and security, at home, in the streets and in the cities," he said.

"I believe that what the people want to see is more presence of the law, and stricter enforcement of the laws on the books," Schofield said. "The greatest deterrent to crime is the knowledge that punishment will be swift."
