Five nationally-known speakers will present seminars on teleprocessing, skills for production supervisors and on the job of the controller this summer at the University of Nevada, Las Vegas.

Co-sponsored by the College of Business and Economics and the Division of Continuing Education, the programs and their dates of instruction: 'Designing, Developing and Operating Teleprocessing Systems, July 12-14; "Supervisory Skills for First Line Manufacturing and Production Supervisors and Fore-men," July 26-28; and "Job of the Controller," Aug. 10 and 11.

An overview of the latest development in distributed electronic data processing will be conducted by George E. Chamberlain, Senior systems analyst for the Lexar Corporation.

Specific topics will include an introduction

on the teleprocessing environment, equipment, use of terminal devices, communications software, system design and management and administration of teleprocessing services.

Speakers for the first line supervisor sem-

inar include Dr. Louis V. Imundo Jr., assistant professor of management at Wright State University; and Dr. Donald B. Sparks, presi-

dent of Sparks and Company, consultants.
This seminar is desinged to help first line supervisors plan work more effectively, delegate responsibility, manage employeere-lations, handle grievances, train workers, make decisions and manage time.

William J. Horne, faculty member of the department of finance at Boston College School of Management, and John Galt Preston, associate professor of finance at Boston College, will present the workshop on the job of the controller.

Management of working capital, intermediate and long-term assets, human relations, and general marketing and production management are some of the topics to be explored.
