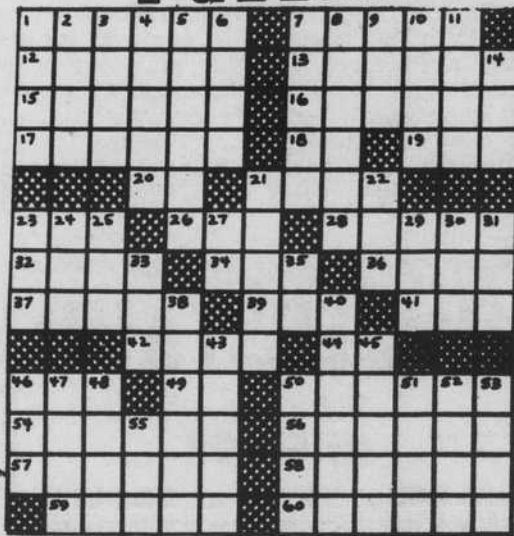

## YOUR LIFE INSURANCE

Prepared by the American Society of Chartered Life Underwriters, the national society of life insurance professionals who have earned the C.L.U. designation by meeting high educational, ethical and experience requirements.

Q. All right, what happens if I get sick and can't work. How can life insurance protect me and my family then?

A. One way would be to make sure the life insurance policy you buy has a "waiver of premium" provision. If it does, and you become permanently or totally disabled, the company would pay the premiums for as long as that condition exists.

You might also look into a special addition to your life insurance policy called a "disability income benefit" provision. It would pay a specified amount each month until you reach the age of 65, if you are totally disabled. Of course, the cash value of your permanent life insurance policy can also help out in an emergency.

## WINNERS & LOSERS

The longest winning streak in baseball history occurred between Sept. 7 and Sept. 30, 1916 when the New York National League team won 26 games in a row.



A long streak of losses has been experienced by union organizers. For instance, only about 22% of the U. S. work force are union members, it's only 10% in the textile industry, and after almost 15 years of all-out effort, union organizers have achieved the representation of less than seven percent of the workers at J. P. Stevens.

Today's maillots can be strapped or strapless, plunging or scooped at the neckline. They show up in brilliant shades like bright turquoise, rose pink and yellow—or in dazzle-the-sun prints.

Whichever, the new mailot is "de rigueur" for the serious swimmer—and for the woman who just wants to help keep our beaches looking beautiful.

Back in 1909, Adeline Trapp was fighting for the right of women swimmers to wear one-piece bathing suits. She was censured, however, for wearing a one-piece suit in a 24-mile race down the Hudson River—a race in which she defeated 24 male swimmers.

In 1926 Gertrude Ederle swam the English Channel in a form-fitting knit suit—the first tank suit to make a splash in the newspapers. It was a harbinger of the fitted maillots that were so much in the swim throughout the '30's and the '40's.

The maillot (pronounced my-OH) was eclipsed by the birth of the bikini in France (July 1946 is the date to remember) although it did continue as the "classic" swimsuit.

Now, in 1978, the sleek, one-piece maillot is once again making big fashion waves. From the French word meaning tights, the maillot is cut to give a woman a long, leggy look. And, when the maillot is made with "Lycra" spandex, the wearer is assured of a smooth and marvelously flattering fit in or out of the water.
