SOCCER PLAY OFF

With a playoff berth safely secured, the Washington Diplomats resume their battle for a home playoff game this week with two key contests. The Dips host American Conference East leader New England Wednesday night, July 26, then travel to Rochester for a return meeting with the Lancers Saturday, July 29. Both games begin at 8 p.m. EDT and can be heard live on WTOP-Radio with Mike Lange calling the play-by-play. Don Earle and Terry Hanson will provide the commentary for WTTG-Channel 5 from Rochester on a delyaed basis beginning at 12:30 a.m.

Although the New York Cosmos clinched the National Conference East title with a 2-1 victory over Settle on Sunday, the Diplomats are still in a position to assure themselves of a home game in the first round of the playoffs if they finish with the best secondplace record in the conference. Currently, the Dips trail Portland, the second-place team in the Western Division, by five points, but Washington has played one game less than the Timbers.

NASL's fifth-leading defense. One of the Leaure's top goalkeepers all season, Keelan is currently third in the American Conference with a 1.24 goals against average. The Tea Men have been hurt by recent

injuries to key starters. Midfielder Gerry Daly suffered a fractured jaw in an auto accident last week and will miss Wednesday's game. Defender David D'Errico (sprained Knee) and midfielder Keith Weller (hamstring)

are both questionable. AND THE LANCERS . . . Saturday's 3-4 loss to the Diplomats hindered Rochester's playoff hopes, but the Lancers still have a legitimate wildcard shot. Occupying the basement in the National Conference East, Rochester has a 12-15 record with 155 points. In order to qualify for the playoffs, the Lancers need to win their remaining three games to stave off Dallas and Seattle. Should Rochester qualify, it is likely that all four teams in the Eastern Division will appear in the playoffs.
