Skateboards Challenging Bicycles

It's only a thin slice of board, resting about five inches off the pavement, attached to four silver dollar-size wheels.

But last year, 25 people in the U.S lost their lives in skateboard a c c i dents, and another 106,000 skateboarders were sent limping into hospital emergency rooms, reports the Insurance Information Institute.

According to traffic safety officials, the skateboard safety hazard ranks next to darting out from between parked cars in congested urban neighborhoods.

Although bicycles still have a solid No.l grip on the federal government's ranking of hazardous products in the home, skateboards have jumped into seventh place as the most likely way of picking up a painful, sometimes fatal, injury.

As the 1978-79 school season moves into full swing, statistics from the National Safety Council and the Consumer Product Safety Commission offer sobering reminders that wheels of all sizes, whether connected to rolling toys or moving automobiles, are potential death traps.

National figures from the National Injury Information Center strongly support the concern of safety officials over the rise in skateboard injury accidents.

Looking at the past four years, the number of skateboard-related injuries has soared to thirty times the 1973 f i g ur e--from 3,680 to the 106,00 mark reported a year ago!

Four hazard patterns were recognized as most dangerous for skateboarders. The study said that 35 oercent of all hospital-treated injuries could have been avoided if skaters paid attention to the following hazards:

1. Avoided skating from hard to soft sur-

face areas, i.e., roadway to grass or dirt.

2. Avoided skating where f i x e d objects such as trees and shrubbery are prevalent.

Did not skate on public roads.
 Did not skate on unimproved sidew all ks or in alley ways.

The Insurance Information I nstitute reminds adult cyclists ansparents of children who rife wheeled toys to follow a few safety rules that will help avoid painful injury and eliminate hundreds of deaths resulting each year from carelessness:

Bicycles are now generally expected to be operated under the same rules and local traffice or dinances as motor vehicles and should always be properly equipped with re-

flectors and other safety devices.

Parents should be wary of allowing their children to ride toys such as the three-foot high "Big Wheel" tricycle near streets where both rider and toy are obscured from motorists whose cars have four-foothigh fenders. The Institute suggests that parents ataach some sort of flexible pole with a bright-colored flag to the rear of the toy to warn approaching motorists.
