For the first time in its history, the Veterans Administration is issuing personal identification cards to more than two million service-disabled veterans to emphasize their top priority in obtaining treatment at VA medical centers and out patient clinics.

Some 237,000 exservice members live in foreign countries and U.S. territorial possessions, 163,000 of them in Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands.

The Veterans Administration operates one of the largest life insurance programs in the world, administering some \$97 billion in life insurance policies for 7.9 million veterans and military service personnel.

Addresses can be changed by calling the Clark County Election Department at 382-4982 through Friday, January 26th, 1979; after that date, and through the close of registration, Saturday, February 3rd, changes of address can only be done in person at the Clark County Election Department, 400 Las Vegas Boulevard South.

UNLV

A piece of downtown property valued at \$252,000 has been contributed to the University of Nevada, Las Vegas by a pioneer Las Vegas couple and their business partners from Omaha, Nebraska.

The gift was offered by Edward and Marjorie Barrick, longtime real estate and hotel developers here, and Sam and Mary Ziegman of Omaha.

Proceeds from the sale of the property will be used to enrich the academic programs of the College of Business and Economics on the campus.

The property consists of nearly one third of an acre on the northeast corner of Casino Center Boulevard and Clark Street.

Business dean Dr. George W. Hardbeck said the donation would enable the college to improve its teaching excellence and its research efforts. A portion of the proceeds, he said, have been earmarked to promote economic education within the college.

The Barricks came to Las Vegas nearly 30 years ago from Omaha, and have been close to education throughout their careers. Mrs. Barrick earned a business administration degree

from Creighton University and has been taking courses at UNLV for the past 13 years. Her husband is a graduate of the University of Iowa law school.

Mrs. Barrick announced the gift during a recent visit to the office of acting university president Dr. Brock Dixon.

"I've seen the college grow from nothing, and I admire the way the school of business is managed and run," she told Dixon.

She said she has been enrolled not only in business classes over the years at UNLV, but has taken history, political science and philosophy courses on the campus, too.

"Education has meant a great deal to me," Mrs. Barrick said. "I've been going to school all my life, and I think it's fun."

She said her mother, a former school teacher, is still taking university classes at 90, "studying astronomy of all things."

Mrs. Barrick, who has been active on the Nevada Council on Economic Education, told campus administrators that she is proud to help improve the educational programs at UNLV, since a sound educational system is the best way to attack the world's problems.
