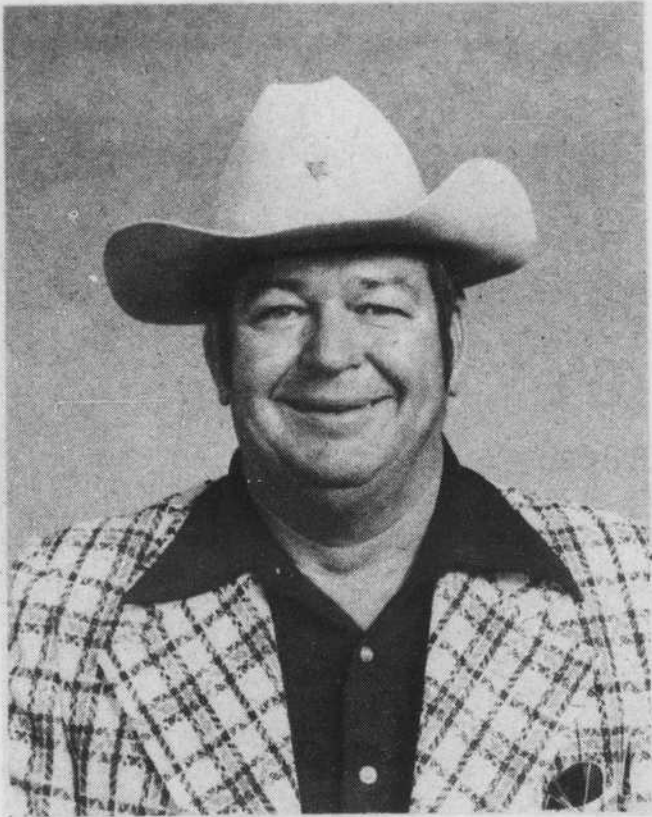


Captain Bill Barstis Seeks



Constable Office

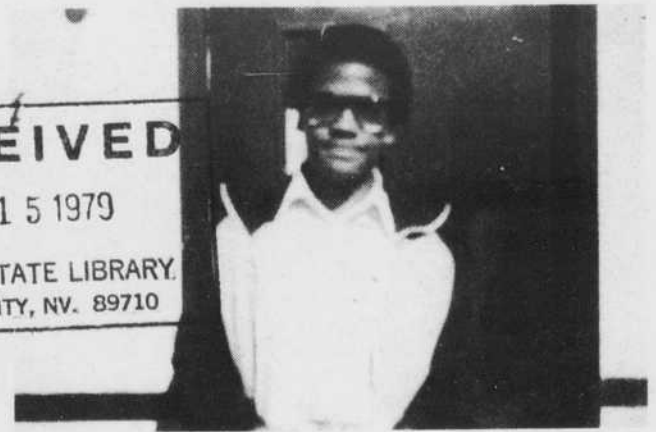
