### Red Rock Elementary School

Red Rock School has implemented three new programs for children with educational handicaps. There are three Educable Mentally Handicapped Trainable Mentally Handicapped classes (EMH/TMH), one Learning Disabilities class (L. D.), and two Severe Language Handicapped classes. Red Rock is one of only two Elementary schools in Clark County offering these programs.
