

Lady Rebels

Opening the New Year by hosting the Las Vegas Round Robin Tournament, the No. 14 ranked University of Nevada, Las Vegas, Lady Rebels upped their season mark to 13 - 0 and extended their home game win streak to 50 with wins over Northwest Missoure State (80-50), previously unbeaten (14 - 0) Northern Okla-homa (88 - 65), the nation's No. 1 rated junior college team, and Temple College (93 - 87).

In exhibition action, the Lady Rebels turned back the tourney's only non-American entrant, the University of Mexico 91 - 80.

Other participants and their tourament records were Northern Oklahoma (2 - 1), Temple College (1 - 2), Northwest Missoure State (1 - 2) and the University of Mexico (0 - 30.

Teresa Endicott Willis (Jennings, OK-Olive HS), an All-America candidate and the tourney's Most Valuable Player, turned in a 85-point and 46-rebound three-game performance for the Lady Rebels. In the Northwest Missouri State contest, 5 - 9 forward set a UNLV mark when she attempted 21 free throws. Backcourt ace, Tina Glover, also represented

coach Dan Ayala's group on the All-Tourney team. A graduate of Pittsburg (CA) High School, Glover highlighted her 45-point and 20-assist tournament showing when she connected on 12 of16 shots from the field for 24 tallies in the match-up with the Lady Mavericks of Northern Oklahoma.

Completing the All-Tourney squadwere Robyn Kramer and Teresa Curl from Northern Oklahoma, Elsa Flores from Mexico and Temple College's Debbie Polk, whose 49-point effort against Mexico was just one point shy of the opponent's total of 50.

This will be the first meeting between UNLV and Iona. This will be the second meeting between UNLV and Wyoming. Wyoming beat UNLV earlier this year, 84-70 in Laramie. Unlv's Jerry Tarkanian is in his sixth season

at UNLV and 11th as a major college coach. The nation's winningest active major college coach has a lifetime record of 259-49 and his record at UNLV is 137-29. Iona's head coach is Jim Valvano. He is in his seventh season as a head coach. In his fourth year at Iona, his current record is 57-40. Wyoming's Jim Brandenburg is in his third year as a head coach and his first at Wyoming. His career total is 50-23 and at Wyoming he is 11-7.
