They're all correct, depending upon belt which drive breaks. Many cars have three belts under the hood.

The thermostat is intended to maintain very close temperature tolerances. NEVER remove the thermostat for summer driving. Your car needs one all year round.

The term "permanent" generally assogenerally associated with anti-freeze is a misnomer. Antifreeze/coolant should be replaced annually after the car is two years old.

Free-wheeling fans and flexible blade fans are becoming more popular, especially with higher demands on cooling systems and with greater concern for fuel economy.

Never open the pressure cap on an overheating engine. Instead, let the engine cool. Then, with a thick wad of cloth or toweling, carefully remove the cap to release the pressure gradually.

To assure a tight seal on your new hose, install new clamps.

A word to the wise should be sufficient.

Most mechanics are equipped with pressure testers and usually have a minimal charge for this service.
