CETA SUMMER YOUTH PROGRAM

A total of 1,747 economically disadvantaged youth in Clark County will participate in the CETA Summer Youth Employment Program (SYEP) conducted by the Clark County School District, Angus MacEachern, acting executive director of the local consortia, has announced.

The program, beginning June 18, will provide work experience and vocational education under the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act at a cost of \$1,123,725.00. The program will end in early August. This is the third year the school district has conducted the program.

At a ceremony held Thursday in City Hall, the contract was signed by Ron Lurie, mayor pro tem of the city of Las Vegas and chairman of the CETA Executive Board; Frank Dixon, director of federal programs of the Clark County School District, and Connie Marmet Department of Labor Employment and Training Administration representative from the San Francisco regional office.

The program is designed for youths between the ages of 14 and 21 who lack the necessary funds and skills to continue their edcucation. It provides an opportunity to obtain skill training which can be realized in on-the-job training, classroom experience and work experience.

The program also provides financial assistance for those students who may be potential dropouts to aid them in remaining in school. Average wages and allowances for each participant will be \$2.90 an hour.

Under work experience, participants will receive labor-market orientation and placement in a suitable work site. In the event a youth is not returning to school, he will be referred to the Nevada Employment Security Department for job placement into permanent, unsubsidized employment.

In the vocational career education segment, participants will receive labor-market orientation, classroom training and referral for job placement if they are not returning to schoo.
