END-OF-YEAR REPORT 1978-79

During the 1978/779 school year staff was increased from 6 to 16 persons. This expansion included extending coverage to the sixth Grade Centers and Opportunity School. This has reduced the work load for most staff members to three schools. The increase has made it possible for more home visitations, student problem solving, and more time to encourage student involvement in school activities.

When implementing ethnic programs such as Hispanic Week, Black History Week, etc. the Human Relations Workers contacted many agencies to provide 'role' models such as Mrs. Culliver-Westside Library, Jay Cameron-Jazz Musician, and Virginia Brewster-School Board Member as guest meeters for Plack History Week

speakers for Black History Week. The human Relations Office surveyed the Sixth Grade Centers, Junior and Senior High Schools, to determine the ethnic breakdown of student participation in Student Government, Cheerleaders, Songleaders, etc., excluding sports. The results of this survey will be utilized to identify any lack of monority involvement in student activities. Attached is a chart listing some of the activities that the Human Relations Workers are involved in.

During the school year the Human Relations Workers were asked to transport students home for various reasons. The workers discussed problems with parents and students. Sometimes appointments were scheduled for parent conferences.

The following list is a breakdown of home visitations for this school year:
