## OUR GIANTS SPEAK

### THE ROLE OF THE BLACK WOMAN DURING SLAVERY AND RECONSTRUCTION

*The overarching role of black women in the periods of enslavement and reconstruction has received only little of the attention which it so richly merits. Black women have played a major historical role in the life of Black America and of our nation as a whole. In this series, we show the strength, determination, creativity and courage of the "ordinary" black woman—our unsung heroines, from whence, many believe, has sprung our backbone.*

*The following section from the diary of Charlotte Forten Grimke (1837-1914), dated Jan. 31, 1863, tells of her first hand experiences and knowledge of Harriet Tubman while teaching the Freedmen during Reconstruction through the Port Royal Relief Association of Philadelphia.*

#### Part II of Two Parts

Jan. 31 [1863]... In B[eaufort] we spent nearly all our time at Harriet Tubman's—otherwise "Moses." She is a wonderful woman—a real heroine. Has helped off a large number of slaves, after taking her own freedom. She told us that she used to hide them in the woods during the day and go around to get provisions for them. Once she had with her a man named Joe, for whom a reward of \$1500 was offered. Frequently, in different places she found handbills exactly describing him, but at last they reached in safety the Suspension Bridge over the Falls and found themselves in Canada. Until then, she said, Joe had been very silent. In vain had she called his atten-

tion to the glory of the Falls. He sat perfectly still—moody, it seemed, and w'd not even glance at them. But when she said, "Now we are in Can[ada]" he sprang to his feet with a great shout, and sang and clapped his hand sic] in a perfect delirium of joy. So when they got out, and he first touched free soil, he shouted and hurrahed "as if he were crazy"—she said.

How exciting it was to hear her tell the story. And to hear her sing the very scraps of jubilant hymns that he sang. She said the ladies crowded around them, and some laughed and some cried. My own eyes were full as I listened to her—the heroic woman! A reward of \$10000 was offered for her by the Southerners, and her friends deemed it best that she sh'd, for a time find refuge in Can[ada]. And she did so, but only for a short time. She came back and was soon at the good brave work again. She is living in B[eaufort] now; keeping an eating house. But she wants to go North, and will probably do so ere long. I am glad I saw her—very glad...

able to get four corner funding it agreed to work with O.I.C. when it was learned O.I.C. had the backing of the governor. "I think we have all done enough studies and now it's time to get something going for this community. I have a habit of not talking about anyone else's programs, but there is no particular money which belongs to anyone" Chaney said.

On Thursday June 17th however a pact was signed binding groups to take part in a CEDS (Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy) a part of the E.D.A. (Economic Development Administration) which is an arm of the Commerce Department to release some 6 million dollars in the first year. Las Vegas is one of a reported 8 areas in the west to be designated a CEDS area, and was chosen as one of the special impact areas because of high unemployment and the lack of industry in the Westside area. Those signing the pact were: Earl Singer, a community planning development consultant for Region IX of the Housing and Urban Development Department; Powell McDaniels, Office of Minority Business Enterprise deputy regional director; David Hoggard, Clark County Economic Opportunity Board executive director; Sam Bowler, Clark County Board of Commissioners chairman; Phyllis Lamphere, EDA regional director; Marjorie Elliott, SNEDC chairperson; Dr. Alan Haile, Commerce Department representative; Otis Harris; Ray Daines, North Las Vegas; Bill Briare, Las Vegas mayor, and Bob Bailey, Nevada Economic Development Co. executive director.

A Federal court ruling that the I.R.S. had levied taxes improperly on the cost of meals at the Tropicana Hotel has prompted the M.G.M. Hotel to ask all its employees and former employees to give their permission for M.G.M. to appeal the I.R.S. taxation of that money which is shown as income on employee W 2's for meals provided. Although Income Tax Laws provide that this money is deductible from total earnings, employees have been taxed for social security and the effort involved is an attempt to get a refund of that taxation.

power to achieve their goals. Vice President Mondale also called on blacks to vote more in his speech at the NAACP convention. No one who is aware of the extent to which black voters do not register or vote can truly take offense at this concern. Black Americans, however, aware that fully 93% of their vote in 1976 went to President Carter have expressed disappointment that the President has sought to broaden his political base too often at their expense.

The question about the anticipated level of black support for Mr. Carter in 1976 can therefore be expected to increase. The problem is, however, that at present blacks see no suitable alternative among the announced Republican candidates, except for John Anderson of Illinois. The others appear to be washed-over conservatives with interests antithetical to blacks. We shall hopefully await the entry of others in the field.

So, as of now, the only possibility of a choice for them would be if Massachusetts Senator Ted Kennedy challenged the President in the primaries next year. The Kennedy mystique is still very strong among blacks. And even though he helped contribute last year to the defeat of Edward Brooke, the only Black in the Senate, it appears that many blacks would swing over to the Massachusetts senator, if not out of commitment, at least in anger and frustration.

Mr. Kennedy, however, has said that he will support Mr. Carter in his reelection bid. We hope he does. Because the prospect of repeating the 1968 debacle, which saw Richard Nixon, the GOP Presidential candidate, defeating civil rights stalwart Hubert Humphrey, is too painful to encourage.
