

Sports In Sight



Ken Norton, former world heavyweight boxing champion, has been named to the Board of Directors of the International Boxing Hall of Fame, according to an announcement today by President Jim Caufield.

"It is with great pride and tremendous joy that I announce this appointment," said Caufield. "Ken Norton is the epitome of the champion, and his presence on our team will do much to point up and enhance the monumental task which lies before us."

Norton, handsome and erudite, has embarked upon a successful career as an actor and is expected to be a spark plug in the organization's quest for funds to build the 50 Million Dollar shrine on property at the Dunes Hotel in Las Vegas.

Ed (Too Tall) Jones is coming to the conclusion that there's a little future in boxing for 6-9, 270-pound football players. The former All-Pro defensive end was stung when the Nevada State Athletic Commission failed to sanction two of his fights. Jones is now contemplating a return to the Dallas Cowboys.

His manager, Dave Wolf, has advised that he quit the ring. "It left us in a position where he could not fight enough to become a contender," Ring said Wolf, referring to Nevada's board refusal.

Jones had won all six of his bouts against lack-luster opponents but had not fought since a Jan. 22 knockout of Billy Joe Thomas in Indianapolis.


The Amateur Athletic Union will hold its National Senior Boxing Championships for 1980 at Caesars Palace Sports Pavilion.

Over 250 amateur boxers from 22 regions throughout the United States will arrive May 4 at Caesars Palace to participate in the National Championships.

Boxing action begins Monday (May 5) when fans will be able to watch three rings of great boxing simultaneously. The 3-ring action continues on Tuesday and Wednesday evenings. On Thursday two rings will be used. Friday the boxers will rest in preparation for the final competition on Saturday night, which will be taped for later broadcast by ABC.

Doors to the Sports Pavilion will open at 5:30 each day except Saturday, when they will open at 7 o'clock.
