

Vincent Saunders Announcement

Roofs: What You Should Know

Are you aware of the following facts about roofs?

1. The best time to replace your roof is long before trouble starts. If you have a leak, you may already have extensive damage in the deck beneath the roof. When your roof is really in bad shape, it may be too late to think of cosmetic features like color, shadowlines and texture of the roofing material.
2. A 15-year-old house may need a new roof. Why? The average life of the shingles used for most homes is 15 years.
3. More than 85 percent of the homes in the U.S. have asphalt-shingle roofs. The remainder are covered with cedar, tile and other materials.
4. The best way to tell whether you need a new roof is to call in a professional roofer and let him look for these telltale signs: shingles with curled edges that are obviously dried out; shingles bare of protective granules; lots of granules in drains and gutters; rusted out or loose metal flashing in areas where roof and chimney, vents and other structures meet; dried out



or missing caulking; loose nails and shingles; clogged drains.

5. Standard-weight shingles, which last about 15 years, protect against the elements at reasonable cost. For a longer-lasting roof, you might choose premium shingles, like GAF Timberline, that come in pleasing, natural earth-tone shades and interesting random patterns.
6. A good way to choose a roofing contractor is to look around the neighborhood for good-looking roofs and find out who did the job. Be sure to check his references and qualifications. Or check the Yellow Pages, under GAF, for a listing of reputable local roofing contractors. Having this information at your disposal can save you years of grief - and many leaks - later on.
