

The National Association of Colored Wo-The National Association of Colored Wo-men's Clubs, Inc. (NACWC), the nation's oldest Black women's volunteer service or-ganization, will address key social issues affecting Blacks and observe "National Black Women's Week" at its 42nd Biennial Con-vention in Washington at the Capital Hilton Hotel, July 26 - August 1, 1980. "This is a crucial period for Blacks," explained Mrs. Inez W. Tinsley, president of the Association. "We will be analyzing various methods to confront the problems facing our communities and youth." A major convention highlight will be the observance of National Black Women's Week from July 27 to August 1st. According to Mrs.

observance of National Black women's week from July 27 to August lst. According to Mrs. Tinsley, the contributions of Black Women to American society are tremendous. "Not only the community, but the nation has benefited from the commitments and leadership of Black women," Tinsley explained. The convention theme, "Humanitarian Ef-

forts Toward Universal Aims: Equality, Free-dom and Justice," is expected to attract some 1,000 participants from NACWC's 1,000 clubs nationwide. Several prominent speakers are slated to address the week-long convenare slated to address the week-long conven-tion, including the Honorable Patricia Harris, Secretary, Health and Human Resources, Mrs. Margery Gaillard, and Dr. Rev. Deborah P. Cannon-Wolfe, Professor of Education at Queens College in New York. Workshops will focus on issues such as Education, Employment, Health, Housing and Legislation.

Nevada Attorney General Rules

On Officer Resignation

Incumbent county or township officers must resign their positions if they wish to run for election for county commissioner, accord-ing to an opinion from the Nevada Attorney General's Office.

Attorney General Richard Bryan said und-er Nevada law, incumbent county and township officers are ineligible to either run for election for county commissioner or hold the office of county commissioner at the same time they serve in another office.

The only exception, according to Bryan, applies to incumbent county commissioners

who are running for reelection. The opinion, drafted by Deputy Attorney General Don Klasic, states the purpose of the statutes appears to prevent incumbent officers from the temptation of using their present office replicad advancement

office for political advancement. The formal opinion was requested by Nevada Secretary of State William Swackhamer.
