ROCKEFELLER FOUNDATION AWARDS MINORITY GRO

The Rockefeller Foundation today announced the winners in its Research Fellowship Program for Minority-Group Scholars.

Fifteen men and women were selected by a distinguished advisory panel from a group of approximately 150 applicants.

In the area of the social sciences, award winners will undertake research on problems of high priority affecting minority group members, in fields such as education, employment, housing and civil rights. Subjects to be studied include a policy analysis of the effects of Federal legislation upon the education of handicapped black children and an analysis of the social interactional strengths of Mexican-American families.

In the area of the humanities, scholars will investigate subjects in disciplines such as history, literatture, and philosophy, seeking to provide a humanistic perspective on minority-group issues. Award winners will study such wide-ranging subjects as the development of the barrio in Los Angeles, San Antonio, and Chicago; the rhetoric of the blac American sermon; and the history of two Chinese American families from the Old World to the New, 1880-1980.
