## ESPN Thursday Night Fights

It'll be a night of champions when the Thursday Night Fights resume at the Caesars Palace Sports Pavilion on July 24.

This major program of boxing will be the fourth in the series to be held at Caesars Palace. The tournament is presented by Top Rank, Inc., and will be broadcast live across the United States by the Entertainment and Sports Programing Network (ESPN).

Doors will open at 5:30 p.m. with the first bout beginning at 6:00 p.m. Tickets are priced at \$10 for ringside and \$5 general admission.

The highlight of the card will be the InterRegional Semi-Final Middleweight bout between Randy McGrady and Guy Kennedy.

McGrady represents the Western Region and
earned a spot in the semi-finals by winning
both his bouts at Caesars Palace. McGrady,
from Los Angeles, will carry a ring mark of
10-1 into this fight. To reach the semifinals, he defeated Los Angeles' Rodrigo
Hernandez on May 1 and Mauricio "El Gato"
Aldana, also of Los Angeles, on May 29.
Kennedy, representing the Northeast Region is from the Brony New York, His

Kennedy, representing the Northeast Region, is from the Bronx, New York. His record is an unblemished 8-0 entering this fight with McGrady.

Both McGrady and Kennedy will receive \$3,000 for this fight, with the winner advancing to the finals against the winner of the other semi-final bout between the victors of the East and Mid-West Regions. Each fighter in the finals will be awarded \$4,000 with the overall winner to get an additional \$1,000 ad a guaranteed match within three months against a world contender ranked #10 or above.

Also on the July 24 card will be the West Regional Lightweight Championship between Blaine Dickson of El Monte, CA and Roberto Garcia of Los Angeles. Dickson, 7-1, defeated Los Angeles' Rosendo Ramirez on June 26 to earn a spot in the final. Garcia has a record of 10-7-2, and will face Dickson after besting Carlos Villacana of Phoenix.

Americans Missed In The Olympics

According to the United Press International report, the Moscow Games have been damaged by the boycott of the United States government, but the Olympics still are being held in Moscow as planned.

The athletes have demonstrated that they oppose the boycott led by the United States and prompted by the Soviet Union invasion of Afghanistan.
