During the 1979-80 school year the sixteen member Human Relations Staff worked together to provide the Clark County School District with a positive year to the implementation of many Human Relations activities. However, there has been a reduction in staff. The objectives of the department remains the same. With the cooperation and assistance of the schools administrators, students, attendance officers and co-workers, the Human Relations staff will utilize its services relating to students, parents, agencies and other areas when necessary.

for the Human Relations worker is to establish a parent/school relationship. Many parents feel competent knowing that a Human Relations person will upon request, sit in on parent conferences.

In addition, the Human Relations Staff plays a major role in student motivation; assisting the minority student in all areas, where deemed necessary.

Listed are a few of the accomplishments through the department during the 1979 - 80 school year: 1507 home visits were made where students were involved; 1725 class room visits; 731 parent conferences were held. 1081 conflict resolutions were solved.

Centers, 1979-80 school year, 175 minority students were involved in student government and 46 Class Officers. 61 officers were elected to the Human Relations Commission. 10 students participated in journalism. 160 students were on the drill team.
