a ... power rhetoric imported from the U.S., and a romantic Marxism from Cuba.

Manley launched a series of reforms in attempt to bridge these conflicts and fulfill some of the democratic socialist ideals which he had acquired at the London School of Economics.

Public schools were opened to all, health services were extended, and minimum wage laws for domestic and farm workers were enacted. Jamaica's masses began to get a piece of the action.

In the midst of the current election cam-

paign, Jamaica is beset by inflation which exacerbates the problem, eats away at the economy, and threatens the further development of social services and improvement of living standards.

Edward Seaga, the opposition leader of the Jamaica Labor Party, pledges to revitalize the economy by renewing the confidence of American and British investors. But with the world recession underway, it is hard to imagine his getting more support from these sources than Jamaica is now receiving in private investments from Norway, West Germany and

Canada. The polls and press have counted Manley and his party out, but these are the instruments of the middle and upper classes. The Jamaican populace is predominantly poor and working class, and from the bottom up, the progress over the last 10 years has been more significant than the suffering. Poverty has always been there, but the poor are not going to give up their progress and their hope without a good Jamaican fight.

The outcome of this struggle will redefine this island nation's identity and set its course for the next five years.

ferences in performance among students in a poor neighborhood, depending on the school they attended. "Education cannot compensate for the inequalities of society," said the report. "Nevertheless, we do suggest that schools constitute one major area of influence, and one which is susceptible to change."

A number of newspapers have carried stories in recent months of success in places where failure is usually reported:

—At P.S. 91 in Brooklyn, an overcrowded school with virtually 100 percent minority enrollment, the graffiti, noise and truancy levels are going down while reading performances are going up.

—In Philadelphia, students in middle and upper grades are generally recording the highest scores they've gotten since testing was begun in 1967.

—At the Beasley Academic Center on Chicago's South Side, youngsters have achieved the highest reading scores and top attendance records in that city. This, mind you, is one of the poorest areas.

—Detroit, Newark, New Orleans, children are raising their reading scores.

Sure, these examples of success are still the exception, not the rule. Most big-city schools

are bogged down by the problems I mentioned earlier, and their students lag behind. What's more, there's no guarantee that even if educators determine the qualities that make for a successful school — effective leadership, strong discipline, devoted teachers, concerned parents? — they

can be applied everywhere.

Nevertheless, as a ghetto school becomes the pride of South Side Chicago, as a child reads better than his brothers and sisters did in Philadelphia — then we can be at least a little hopeful when those school bells start ringing again this week.
