

'Flight Of Bumble Bee' 7 Days From 'Last Hurrah'

The stage is about set at the mammoth outdoor arena taking shape on the western section of Caesars Palace parking lot - near the Sports Pavillion. It will be the site for the Oct. 2 World Boxing Council heavyweight championship fight between the champion Larry Holmes and the challenger Muhammad Ali.

At the moment, a psychological warfare permeates the air between Holmes and Ali and, as time wears on, the battle of words should reach an all-time high.

as usual, is talking a good game. He appears obsessed over being able to lose the excess weight in a comparatively short time.

"Look at me, three months ago I weighed over 250 and was fat and sloppy. Now I am trim, fast and dancin'. Larry Holmes hasn't got a chance," Ali bragged, as his weight of 224 was announced.

"Three weeks ago my waist was 381/2, now it's 371/2. By fight time I will be down to 36," Ali grinned. "That is as good as it was when I knocked out George Foreman in Zaire (1974).

The "Louisville Lip" continued, "I am the only man in the world who can make time stand still. A man that

sets his mind can accomplish the impossible. I have proven three times that I am that kind of man. I will do it again."

Ali flatly predicts that he will beat Holmes. "I'm too fast, too smart for that duck," All said while dancing around the ring during his workouts. At the same time, one of his trainers, Bundini Brown kept yelling: "Come on yelling: "Come on champ. Float like a butterfly and sting like a bee.

Ali has trained harder for this fight than anytime since he won the title from George Foreman.

Holmes is just as confident that he will beat Ali and predicts that he will finish Ali before the 10th round. Ali says he will take Holmes in 10 rounds.

"I want to knock this guy out.Itwon'tbemuch after the fifth round, Holmes predicts.

"I want to take Ali out. I don't want to beat him, I want to take him out. I am young. I could have beaten Ali eight years ago when I was a sparring partner. He is too old for me and he is fat," Holmes said.

The fight, which will take place on a 22-foot ring in the makeshift 25,000-seat stadium, figures to be one of the best heavyweight fights in many years.

Greg Page On Holmes-Ali Garden Telecast

Unbeaten Greg Page ranked the No. heavyweight contender by the World Boxing Association, will be featured in a 10-round bout on the undercard of the Larry Holmes-Muhammad Ali closed circuit telecast at Madison Square Garden Oct. 2.

Page, who is 11-0-0, with 10 knockouts, will meet Dave "Big Foot" Johnson of Bowie, Md., 9-6-0. with two knockouts.

There will be two other 10-rounders on the show

featuring the Holmes-Ali telecast from Las Vegas.

Carmelo Negron of New York, the WBA's No. 6-ranked super featherweight and winner of all of his 13 pro fights by knockout, will Baby meet Chocolate

Philadelphia, who has an 18-4-0 record.

In a welterweight bout, Johnny Turner of New York, 37-4-1, with 28 knockouts, will fight Irish Pat Hallacy of Wichita, Kan., 24-4-0, with 11 knockouts.
