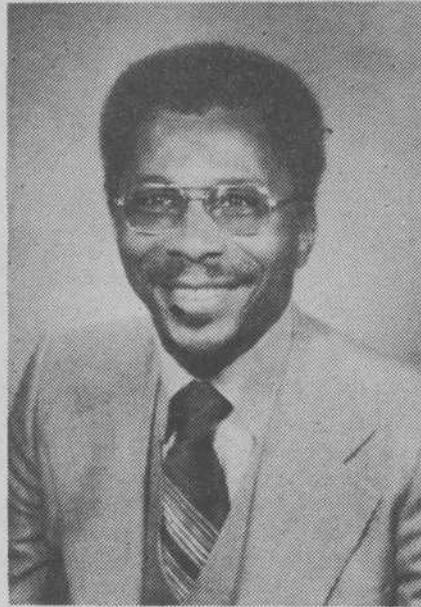

simply a traditional Republican candidate. He is an ultra-conservative who is now attempting to cover up his anti-union and anti-worker pronouncements in a bid to attract blue-collar votes. This deception will not hold water with those who examine his stands on the issues closely. But where Reagan stands to gain most is from those who believe that it does not matter who our next President is, those who are indifferent. All the polls show that those who are least likely to vote are the poor, blacks, and lower income workers: in other words, those who are most likely to support President Carter.

Our country has entered into a turbulent and challenging decade. We face the challenges of international instability, the growth of Soviet imperialism, problems of reindustrialization and modernization. All of these problems require a

unified country. Voter apathy, alas, will not lead to greater unity no matter who wins, because those who do not vote will continue to feel that the government is not their own.

Our futures are in the balance. At a time when our country needs to respond intelligently and compassionately to the needs of the poor, the unemployed, the elderly, and the young, our government must be committed to action. Ronald Reagan preaches the politics of less government and greater profits for big business. President Carter on the other hand has shown his capacity to bring together government, labor, and business in a partnership designed to address the needs of our country.

The 1980 election will be of great significance for our future. It would be a great tragedy if voter apathy resulted in the defeat of a President who listens and is sensitive to the needs of the people. Only through a massive turnout can blacks and other working people demonstrate that the coalition for social progress and economic justice still exists.
