

BISHOP E. N. WEBB TALKS ABOUT: PARENTS AND YOUR CHILDREN

The Bible says to train up a child in the way he should go...(Prov. 22:6). A child is blindly loving, honest, readily forgiving and very easily lead. Jesus said that if we want to be great, we must hum-



ble ourselves as a child (Mat. 18: 1-4).

Oh, what a responsibility we have as parents, being entrusted with rearing of a child, thereby potentially shaping the development of humanity. Besides the threat of injury, there also exists the risk of making a purchase from an unverified source. Still to be reckoned with is the economical exchange merited by the nutritional value gained.

Let us raise the consciousness of our children to all factors and likewise instill a proper appreciation for the value of money. Perhaps taking them to the Credit Union and opening a joint savings account may prove to be one useful means of training our children to save their pennies and dimes. Most assuredly on tomorrow they will be greater men and women for our having done so.
