

CLARK COUNTY COLLEGE COMMUNITY ACTIVITIES

Recruiting teams have been organized to go out into the community to acquaint minority groups with the educational programs at Clark County Community College that have more to offer than the traditional two or four year degree college.

Tom Crenshaw, head of the new recruiting program and also Coordinator of High School Relations, says, "We want to go to the people in their neighborhood to discuss the programs that CCC has that are designed to meet the needs of the community."

Crenshaw continued, "The present administration has sensed the need to provide the service of actively recruiting minority students. We believe that the best way to do this is to form committees and contact these minorities where they live and congregate."

A Spanish-American or Hispanic team and a

black recruiting team have been organized. Mick Howard is coordinating an Indian team and those who are interested in serving on the team on a volunteer basis are urged to contact the college.

Serving with Crenshaw on the Hispanic team are Al Baca, Dorothy Herron and Hal Meneses, all faculty members. Others on the team are Bob Agonia, Dept. of Energy; Irma Garcia, SER/Job for Progress; Andrena Sanchez, "Holmes." Members of the black recruiting team serving with Crenshaw are Dorothy Perkins, Pat Butler, Margy Morris, Fred Hymes, Lou Reed and Betty Pate, faculty members; Sherylyn Wallace, student member.

Registration for the spring semester will begin at the campus in January with classes scheduled to begin January 19.

governments is not comparable to taxes that would be collected from local industry. Also, if employes have commissary privileges state sales tax collections will be minimal compared to the impact this influx of people will have.

So many people have expressed disgust with the Federal Governments handling of public lands through the Sagebrush Rebellion that I am sure they have doubts about the Federal Governments idea of helping us with increased tax burdens. The \$79 billion estimate does not include capital outlays for county services. He also noted that the estimate does not include warhead development, acquisition, and maintenance, nor is it adjusted for inflation in its operations costs. For example, at the Trident Base in Bellingham, Washington payments were made to help with capital expenses, but not for employees and maintenance.
