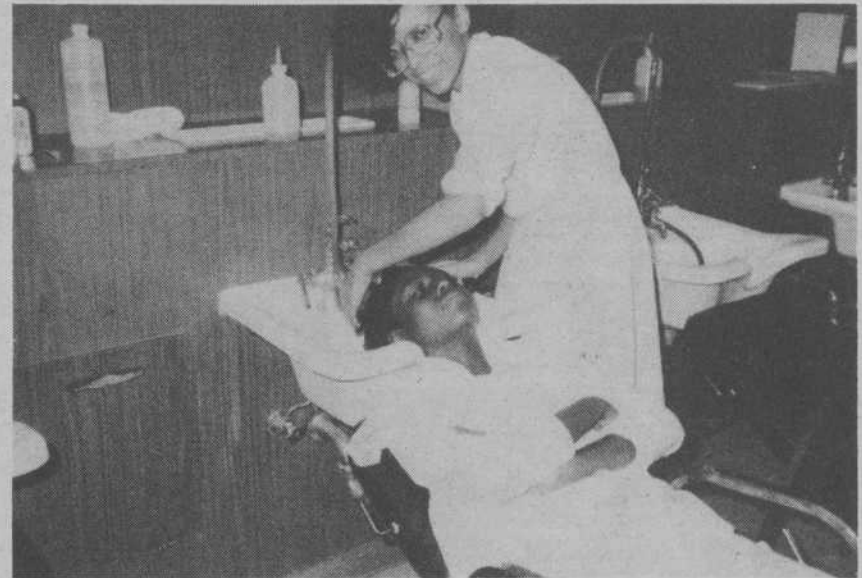
These students are seniors at Vo Tech, the only Vocational Training

Center in the Clark County School District. They will be graduating in June. After 1800 hours of study in various subjects required to complete the course of Cosmetology. After all requirements are met a student is ready to apply for license from the State Board of Cosmetology.

The first year, the junior year of high school, students are taught the basics, which include Theory or book work. Afterward subjects are taught such as Anatomy, Cosmetic Chemistry, Facial (Skin Care), Basic Electricity,

Manicure, Pedicure, Decolorizing the Hair, Hair Cutting, Hair Styling, Cold Waving, Finger Waving, Skip Waving. In addition all types of Hot Iron work, including Marceling, Croq, Curling and permanent.

Mrs. Ida Mae Coleman, Cosmetology Instructor at Vo Tech, for the past 16 years is happy to say most students are well prepared by the time the required hours are completed and face no problems when applying for license, before the State Board of Examiners.

Students Scored Above National Average

For the first time in recent history, eleventh grade students scored above the national average on the standardized California Achievement Test, administered in October to both eighth and eleventh

graders in the Clark County School District.

Results at both grade levels showed improvement over last year's scores.

Eighth graders, for the second consecutive year, surpassed the

national norm. Reading scores improved from the 56th percentile to the 58th and in math, student scores soared six percentile points, from the 58th to the 64th percentile. Growth was retained in language at the 59th percentile and in spelling, at the 60th — both well above the national norm of 50.

Eleventh grader results improved in the total battery of tests by

four percentile points above last year's scores. In reading, scores improved from the 49th percentile to the 53rd; mechanics of English, from the 47th to the 52nd; total language from the 48th to the 51st; and total math from the 51st to the 55th percentile. The largest gain was in math computation with an increase of seven percentile points, from the 49th to the 56th.
