## REBELS RIP COLORADO RAMS BY: Kenneth Wilson

It was one of those games. The kind in which you know your team's gonna win, and the only thing left to the imagination is the final score.

Over at the Convention Center, on Friday night UNLV was part of one of those games, and after overcoming a sluggish start, the Rebels went on to victimize Colorado State University 85-69 before a crowd of 6,393.

Led by Sidney Green's 27 points and 16 rebounds, the Rebels notched their sixth straight win, and elevated UNLV'S chances of receiving a bid from the Nation Invitation Tournament.

Despite its 3-23 record, Colorado State played well in the early part of the game, trading leads with UNLV six times and were tied five times in the first seven minutes of the contest. Sidney Green connected on two free throws at the 13:20 mark to give UNLV the lead, 12-10, which it would not relinquish thereafter.

The Rebels opened up a seven point lead, 23-16, with 9:21 left in the first 20 minutes. Michael Johnson scored 11 of his 26 points to ignite the Rebel spurt over the seven minute span.

Acknowledging the challenge, Ram Dave Horner got hot for five straight baskets and Kevin Bromley flipped in a jumper from the top of the key to pull CSU to within two points, 28-26, with 4:37 left in the half.

The bothersome CSU squad hung tough until the waning moments of the half when a lack of composure helped UNLV outscore them 7-2 to take a 37-30 lead into the lockerroom at halftime.

Opening the second half with a Greg Goojian jumper, Michael Johnson hit a layup and a slam-dunk by Sidney Green gave UNLV the first six points, and pushed its advantage to 13 points, 43-30. But behind forward Scott Mann and center Horner, CSU rallied, pulling to within five points, 58-53, with 10:31 left to play.

CSU, 1-13 on the road, made one last run at the Rebels, now 16-11. With Michael Burns on the bench with four fouls, the Rams inserted a zone press which produced three straight steals by Eddie Hughs who converted two for baskets and dished off to Kevin Bromley for a third hoop.

After a Jerry Tarkanian timeout, and with Burns back in the lineup, both teams continued to exchange baskets until UNLV broke lose with a final spurt to put the game on ice.

With a tip-in by Michael Johnson and two free throws by Sidney Green, the Rebs upped their lead to 10 points. After the surge was interrupted by Ram Rick Semin's layup, a jumper by Green and layups by Johnson and Burns, good for six straight Rebel points and a 14 point lead with 2:02 left, Tarkanian cleared his bench.

"Mike played good and Sid had a great game, and overall we played well and still couldn't blow them out," Tarkanian said. "I've never seen Colorado State shoot that well. We felt that Hughs was their only shooter, but they sure could shoot, couldn't they?"

Junior Dave Horner, who had ben averaging just 2.1 points per game this year, came off the bench and connected on 10 of 12 shots to top CSU in scoring with 20 points.

The Rams, who shot only 57 percent from the field, also got 17 points from all WAC guard Eddie Hughes and Scott Mann had 14.

Other than the combination of Green and Johnson, the Rebels, who shot 66 percent in the second half, finished with only one player, Greg Goojian with 10) in double figures.
