The Quiet Violence



When President Reagan was shot a few weeks ago, there was talk of a mad U.S., of sickness lurking in every corner of society.

The Iranians demonstrated the concept of sickness well when they kept Americans in bondage for 444 days. But, what made them do it? Atlanta, Georgia, is demonstrating the concept in its inability to capture the perpetrators of young murder. What's motivating the killer or killers?

The Vatican shooting of Pope John Paul II must surely place violence in its true light. The incident speaks of the danger of public life, of the breakdown in laws, of the devastatation of the human mind that allows itself to plot and scheme the demise of another. Why?

Handgun legislation has been a focal point in the news within the last couple of months, and evidence suggests this is justified. But, the sad and striking truth is this: 1) violence is



not only a stalwart trait in the U.S., but in most other countries of the world as well, and 2) handguns are not the only route to violent expression.

A brief review of world and local news with respect to violence may help to crystallize these points.

In Las Vegas, 50 persons have already been killed this year, about twice as many as at this time last year. And, during the week of May 10, six homicides occurred.

This writer, seeking a universal explanation, reviewed news events for Monday, March 30, 1981, the day before the President was shot. The idea was to determine what, if any, violence was prevalent, and whether handguns were used in the action.

Focusing on front page information, it was clear that guns have become a primary way to express dissatisfaction (translation; violence).

Of nine stores in *The Washington Post*, six dealt explicitly or implicitly with violence.

The situation with Poland's Communist Party Central Committee was covered in three articles. The shooting of an American hostage at a Bangkok airport was the topic of another article. The attempts of the billionaire Hunt family of Texas to ward off their financial investigation and potential economic sanctions was another story. Another discussed the "strangling" effects of government regulations on colleges.

The L.A. Times had seven out of nine front page stories that dealt with violence or its potential, ranging from the duties of an airplane bounty hunter, to donations for Atlanta's murdered youth, to the situation in Poland (two stories), to a L.A. minister's private war on poverty, to the loss of "life and limb" at the UCLA Medical Center in a county quest to improve emergency treatment, to a slain family of four found shot to death in San Diego.

News in Las Vegas, as reported by the Las Vegas Sun, included four stories of violence out of six: "Hijackers Shoot America;" "Fire Guts Restaurant," "Polish Party Unchanged;" and, "Democrats Facing Another Upstaging."

The list could get longer and more complex, as we move from page one to the end of the paper. Some writers are more subtle in their approaches and some incidents are more easily seen as potentially threatening than others.
