UNLV OFFERS ETHNIC STUDIES

The Ethnic Studies Program of UNLV will offer two courses during the first Summer Session. The five week session will begin June 8 and terminate July 10.

Ethnic Studies 440 will meet on MTWTF from 11:20-12:50 p.m. in WRI 301. The class will concern itself primarily with those events which have taken place since 1950. It will address, among other items, such issues as: school desegration, civil rights, right wing organizations, illegal aliens, affirmative action, police community relations, urban problems, minority organizations, refugees and politics.

Ethnic Studies 460 will meet on MTWTF from 9:40-11:10 a.m. in WRI 301. This class will deal primarily with the impact of the Brown vs. Board of Education Supreme Court decision of 1954 on cultural pluralism in the schools. It will analyze changes in the approach to teaching the social sciences, the needs for greater awareness and sensitivity between teachers, administrators and students, minority parent involvement and the role of teachers outside of the area of social sciences.

Both classes will offer brief historical backgrounds on Black, Asian, Native and Spanish speaking Americans. There will be guest speakers, lectures, films and filmstrips.

WELFARE BENEFITS CUT


The legislative money committees have adopted a welfare budget that mean a drop in the monthly payments to needy mothers and their children.

After the committee approved the welfare spending program, state Human Resources Director Acel Martelle said monthly benefits for the more than 13,000 persons on the Aid to

Dependent children program would probably be cut by about one percent.

The average grant now is \$75 per month.

Senate Majority Leader James Gibson, D-Henderson said, "The sooner they get use to the cap the better." He was referring to the legislative spending limit on social welfare programs.
