

Big Boxing Weekend At Hacienda Hotel

The Hacienda Hotel goes big-time on Saturday, June 27, when it hosts the World Boxing Association junior welterweight championship between undefeated champ Aaron Pryor and No. 1 contender Lennox Blackmoore.

ABC's Wide World Of Sports will telecast the



bout live from the Hacienda.

The 15-round WBA title bout, promoted in conjunction with Don King Productions, is the first network televised fight put on by the Hacienda - but not the first nationally-televised card. Monthly, the resort promotes the ESPN Matador Arena Fights with Bob Arum's Top Rank in the new 22,000 square feet sports complex.

On Friday, June 26, the usual Matador Arena Fight card starts at 7

p.m. with three 10-round contests:

Jeff Shelburg vs. Leroy Caldwell in a heavyweight battle; Blaine Dickson against Manuel Abeday in the lightweight division, plus Mario Chavez and Gilberto Villacana in a tough bantamweight matchup. There will be four other fights, for a




total of 58 rounds.

Tickets remain as usual - \$15 ringside, \$10 preferred and \$5 general admission.-Doors open at 6 p.m.

ThePryor-Blackmoore championship fight will be shown live on ABC, but blacked out in southern Nevada. The mandatory title defense will be held in the Hacienda's new Matador Arena Sports Complex, with seating for upwards of 3.000.

The main bout is scheduled for 2 p.m.

Sports and Recreation Strong Part Of Community College Programs

Have you ever heard of the "Sidewinders" or the "Mustangs"? No? They are organized intramural basketball teams from Clark County Community College. Most people don't even realize that CCCC has a program that provides such activities for it's students. The fact is that CCCC has a tidy variety of sports for the student's benefit as well as the surrounding community.

On a casual stroll to the P.E. Department at CCCC, you can't help but notice a very conspicuous trophy case that displays some 20 trophies, plaques and certificates for tennis, softball. basketball,

bowling, soccer and volleyball. There are championship trophies, second place trophies and even a losers trophy. None of these trophies date back any further than 1976, which tells us something about the recency of the program.

Cochnour, Gordon Coordinator of P.E., **Recreation and Sports at** CCCC, expressed that when he came to CCCC in 1975, there was no such program. The Idaho native played a major role in the successful development of the P.E. program at CCCC but is not quite ready to stop trying to improve upon it. "The main thing I want first is recognition

The second thing Gochnour wants is "a decent facility. We service anywhere from 250 to 350 people a day and this includes nonstudents. We just don't have the proper facility to accommodate them."

Gochnour feels that with all the heavy attention focused on UNLV sports, that people tend to forget that there is another institution of higher learning that provides many such activities for their students. "Our students are second class not

students," Gochnour says, "With 11,000 students enrolled here, how could we (CCCC) be a second class school?" Gochnour says that there was a time at CC-CC when most of the students were thirty or older but now he says there is a much younger enrollment and there is a realization that CCCC is not a trade school.

Although the P.E. program at CCCC does not teach such sports such as football or basketball, it does, according to Gochnour, teach sports that "people can use for a lifetime, such as tennis, bowling, golf and racketball."
