The full text of the Randolph Memorial Fund's statement of purpose appears below:

A. Philip Randolph (1889-1979) was one of this country's foremost

labor and civil rights leaders. He devoted a lifetime of effort to the struggle for social and economic justice for all people, because he believed that the black community could only achieve freedom from oppression and exploitation in a society committed to the principle that everyone is entitled to a dignified and meaningful life. He believed that the black citizen, as indeed all others, could best realize this objective by understanding and supporting the struggle of the trade union movement to translate the promise of America into reality. Freedom for the black worker was only possible in an environment of political,

social, and economic security.

Today, we at the A. Philip Randolph Institute believe it is more important than ever before to keep alive the legacy of A. Philip Randolph.

The thousands upon thousands of black trade unionists who participate in the Institute's programs across the country have accepted the challenge to defend A. Philip Randolph's achievements, and have re-dedicated themselves to the task of completing his work. On their behalf we have established the A. CLARK COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE

The summer planetarium show "The Time of the Triangle" opened at Clark County Community College on June 2. "Triangle" is a program about the stars and constellations of the Summer months. Central to the program will be the famous "Summer Triangle." Programs will be presented every Tuesday evening at 6:30 and 8 p.m. Matinee performances are at 12:15 on Wednesdays. (Except June 17)

EG&G was on the campus of Clark County Community College recently to recruit first-year Electronics students for their 1981 Summer Cooperative Education Program. The Co-op Program is designed to integrate the student's classroom studies with practical work experience.

Howard Schmidt, personnel manager for EG&G, spoke to group of about 25 Electronics students and told them that the Co-op Program will better prepare them for permanent electronics positions. Schmidt said that the students will be assigned to work with more experienced workers on a "buddy-buddy" system. The supervisors will "observe your performance and attitude" Schmidt stated and also the

student's potential as permanent employees.

The program is to work in conjunction with the office of Cooperative Education Work Experience at CCC. Dorothy Perkins, coordinator of Co-op, told the students that they will receive grades according to their performance that may be used as an elective in their major area.

Clark County Community College is the only facility in Southern Nevada which gives the College Level Examination Program, known as CLEP.

"A student with a knowledge of English, Math, or the Social Sciences can save time by taking these tests," said Eugene Braun, Counselor at the Test Center of the College.

Both UNLV and CCC accept the tests as credits towards a degree.

Designed by the Educational Testing Service at Princeton, the CLEP tests are primarily designed for people returning to school with experience in a particular field. For less than \$100 students can take five CLEP tests and gain six credits. Altogether 30 college credits can be obtained through the tests.

CLEP testing is a valuable community service offered by Clark

County Community College. Tests are given every month of the year on the first Tuesdays and Thursdays from 1:00 - 6:00 p.m. Students must arrange to take CLEP tests four weeks in advance.
