### AIRFRAME POWERPLANT

Clark County Community College will be offering courses for the fall semester in the Airframe and Powerplant program.

Due to FAA regulation limiting the size of the class and popularity of the A&P program, prospective students must take a General Aptitude Test as part of the selection process and application for admission.

The courses to be offered are:

Airframe and Powerplant General, a course designed as a prerequisite for the Airframe curriculum and the Powerplant curriculum. The course includes such basic subject areas as Math, Physics, Electronics, FARs, Drafting, Weight and Balance, Aircraft Hardware and Ground Handling. Instruction begins August 31, from 3 p.m. to 9 p.m., Mondays through Fridays until December 7.

Powerplant I is the first half of a two part Powerplant curriculum.

The course includes Operation and Maintenance of Reciprocating Engines, Turbine Engines, and Engine Inspection. It is prerequisite to Powerplant II. Class begins August 31, 3 p.m. to 9 p.m., Mondays through Fridays until December 17.

Both classes will be taught at Southern Nevada Vocational Technical Center, A & P Division, 5710 Mountain Vista.
