Ex-Slave Gains Hall Of Fame

It was announced last week that the former slave Sojourner Truth has been chosen to be inducted into the National Women's Hall of Fame in Seneca Falls, New York.

Because she never gave up her fight for the rights of women and slaves, she has been chosen for this honor now almost 100 years after her death.

Last December
Congress authorized the
creation of the Women's
Rights National
Historical Park in Seneca
Falls to commemorate
the formal beginning of
the U.S. campaign for
equal rights for women.

This upstate New York city was chosen as the site for the shrine because it is credited as the birthplace of the women's rights movement in America.

Sojourner Truth will be one of two women who will be installed on July 18. The name of the second inductee has not been announced as yet.

Carmen is a delightfully attractive black child. At five years old, she is reported to be the "busy body" of her kindergarten class. Carmen average intelligence, yet she is a very articulate child who has acquired very good learning skills. She does well in school. Carmen is alert, active and responsive to affection. She plays well with other children. Like many other little girls, she especially loves stuffed animals. Anthony is Carmen's older brother. He is a handsome and personable boy who will be nine years old in May. Like his sister, Anthony has average intelligence but he lacks motivation complete school assignments. Currently he is achieving at third grade level.

Anthony attempts to be overly conscientious and to act grown-up. This makes him appear older than his years; but away from adults, he can engage in every day eight-year-old behavior.

Both Carmen and Anthony have a background of physical abuse and many foster placements. Because of this unstable environment, Carmen can be expected to be cautious in forming new attachments with adults. Carmen needs a permanent home where she can learn to trust adults again. Anthony tends to blame himself unnecessarily for wrongful actions. He tries to be "perfect" so he will not be moved again. He needs to know it is "Ok" to make mistakes and he won't be "thrown away" for minor infractions.

Carmen and Anthony need a "forever" family who can offer them love and security. They need to be placed together in one adoptive home. AASK is looking for people who can give love and nurturing to hard-to-place children. Prospective parents may be single or married.

Subsidies (payment to the adopting family each month and medical expenses) are available for many of the children. Subsidies may depend on the financial situation of the adoptive family or the child's needs.
