CLARK COUNTY SCHOOL DISTRICT ACTIVITIES

The Clark County School District will increase the cost of school meals for the 1981-82 school year. The increases are lower than what is warranted con-

cents to 40 cents. At the secondary level, the 1980-81 lunch price of \$1 will be increased to \$1.30; breakfasts, which ranged from 35 cents to 45 cents, will be in-



sidering the reduction of federal funds and the increase of food service costs due to several innovations which will be implemented at the start of the new school year. At the elementary school level, lunch prices will be increased from 60 cents to 80 cents; breakfast prices will be increased from 35

creased from 45 cents to 55 cents. The contemplated food service program for the 1981-82 school year is a continuation of the District's effort to maintain low cost prices for student meals. The proposed price increases do not even replace the anticipated loss in federal support.

SCHOOL KITCHENS ARE READY — School cafeteria staffs, using the latest in food service equipment, will prepare thousands of meals daily to feed students District-wide. When school opens August 31, well-balanced, nutritional lunches will be available to students at an increase over last year's prices: 80 cents in elementary schools, and between 85 cents and \$1.30 in junior and senior high schools. Breakfast prices will be offered for 40 cents in elementary schools, and from 45 to 55 cents in secondary schools. Meal prices were increased to offset added food service costs to the District brought about by reduced federal support funds.
