Summer school programs in remedial and enrichment work are offered on a tuition basis. Approximately 1751 students were enrolled in the summer of 1981.

Clark County students exceed national performance on achievement tests, used as state required proficiency examinations.

More than two-thirds of Clark County high school graduates indicate that they have enrolled in post-secondary training after high school graduation.

Report cards are issued for nine-weeks period for grades 1-12

and at the end of each semester for kindergarten.

Nevada law requires school attendance between 7 and 17 years of age. The "dropout" rate is well below the national average.

Kindergarten is a part of the regular school program, but is not compulsory. A child must be five on or before September 30 to enter kindergarten. A child must be six on or before September 30 to enter first grade.

Nevada law requires children to be immunized for Diphtheria, Tetanus, Whopping Cough, Rubello, and Rubeola before attendance.

All secondary schools are accredited by Northwest Accrediting Association. Twenty-one units will be required for

graduation — 11½ required units and 9½ elective, for students who entered ninth grade in September 1979. Graduates prior to 1983 require 19 units.


All schools are racially integrated. Three year-round elementary school programs are in operation.

Title I Programs (Compensatory Education)

Horsemanship
Taught At CCCC

Two exciting new classes in riding and horsemanship are being offered this fall at Clark County Community College with both "in the classroom" and "on the horse" instruction.

Beginning Riding and Horsemanship is a course covering western riding, horse care, riding skills, techniques and safety.

The Light Horse Management course offers classroom instruction on horse selection and care for personal use, form and function, feed and feeding, and facilities and equipment.

Both courses will run for 10 weeks beginning August 31.

The instructor, Ms. Carol Cocks of Las Vegas, is a highly qualified wrangler and horse trainer with credentials from Colorado State University where she received a degree in Animal Science.

Her experiences range through most of the eleven western states, including trips to the Quarter Horse World Championships, driving horse drawn wagons in Yellowstone Park, Wyoming, leading pack trips through the Rocky Mountains, and working as top hand at a well knowntraining center in Colorado.

Classes will be conducted at both the Community College in North Las Vegas and at the popular horse show arena Los Rancheros, just north of Tonapah Highway.

Early registration is recommended. CCCC registration is held daily now through August 26 at the Cheyenne campus.

SECURITY CLASS
