Be sure your bike is safety-equipped: proper reflectors and lights for night riding, slip-resistant pedals, comfortable adjustments of seat and handlebars, proper grips, efficient brakes, a loud horn or bell. And wear clearly visible clothes when riding in traffic.

Know and obey the rules of the road. Ride single file. Obey traffic signals, stay in the right hand curb lane. Never ride against traffic. By all means, never weave in and out of traffic.
